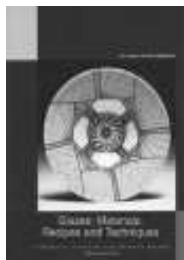

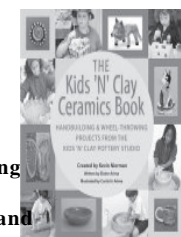

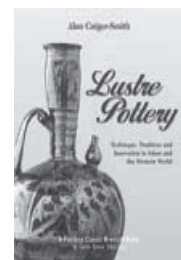
Handbuilding by Hardy
